#### Questions + Answers from the Chat

Does the Alliance for Children's rights support with legal services pertaining to immigration? What is General Neglect?

• Generally, The Alliance for Children's rights refers these cases to Public Counsel

#### Do youth qualify for CalFresh if they are receiving SILP and the Infant Supplement?

- Yes they do, but they only receive \$15 because SILP is considered income by DPSS.
- Cal Fresh is also determined by household income, so when a youth applies they take into account the entire income of the household where they reside unless a youth specifies they are an individual unit responsible for their own expenses.

# When do the EPY conferences take place and could organizations participate if they have been working with a youth?

- Conferences take place Monday to Friday 9-5. With COVID-19 this is taking place via a virtual conference. Prior to COVID-19 it was taking place in person at the DCFS office closest to where the youth resides or in their place of residence.
- If a youth is pregnant they can reach out to their Social Worker to refer the youth to a conference. The Alliance team can also be contacted to assist with the referral process.
- If a youth is working with someone from an organization and they would like them to join the conference, they can inform the social worker and request that this individual join the conference.

#### Does the youth enter as the "emergency" child care program even if there is no emergency?

• The youth has to be in school or working or attempting to get into school or work. They must provide proof of this.

## EIS is only for females not parenting fathers, do you think this would change to assist expecting fathers? Can a father receive this is they are a foster youth and the mother is not?

- At this time the program is only intended for individuals who are pregnant. The non-foster youth is eligible for the CalWorks version of the EIS.
- Support for fathers is also offered by Project Fatherhood
- Public Counsel is also offering family law services which fathers can take advantage of.
- If a father has custody of the child they are eligible for the Infant Supplement.

# What type of mental health resources are brought to help address the needs of the youth especially during the pregnancy?

- This is a part of ongoing conversations where youth are encouraged to seek mental health supports.
- <u>The Nurse Family Partnership</u> which is available for all youth, even if not a foster youth offers licensed therapists to support youth.
